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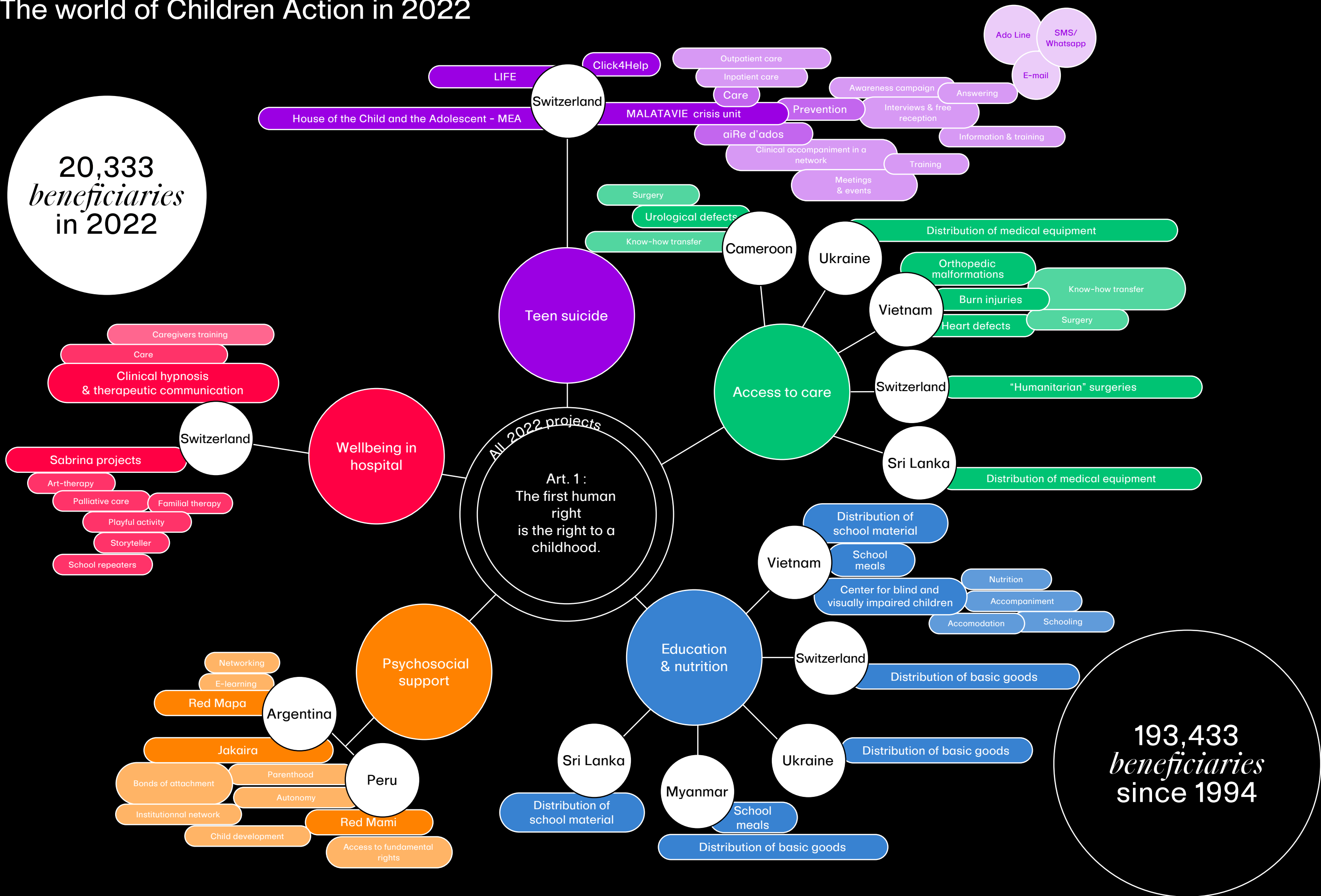
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# The world of Children Action in 2022

# Teen suicide



In Switzerland, suicide is the leading cause of death among 15 to 24 year olds. *Every three to four days, a young person takes their own life.* Desperate acts and calls for help are strongly increasing.

MALATAVIE in Geneva and LIFE in Zurich offer young people in distress multidisciplinary care, focusing the intervention on responsiveness, accessibility and continuity of care.

## MALATAVIE crisis unit *Geneva*

Focusing its intervention on care and prevention, the MALATAVIE crisis unit offers, thanks to a multidisciplinary team, different modes of care (inpatient and outpatient) and prevention in order to facilitate encounters with young people in distress and to offer them the most appropriate response.

This unit created in 1996 in the framework of a public-private partnership between Children Action and the Geneva University Hospitals (HUG) is about to integrate the House of the Child and the Adolescent which will open in July 2023 (see below).

**MALATAVIE Prevention** is aimed at young people aged 12 to 25 who are at risk of suicide, their relatives, parents or friends, as well as the professionals who accompany them.

In 2022, the « Ados Line » (022 372 42 42), which offers adolescents and their families a professional response 24/7, received **1'280 calls from 808 callers. 63% were of a clinical nature, directly related to a sometimes acute suicidal risk.**

Monitoring the 808 situations corresponding to these calls represented some 290 hours of listening and involvement.

For the first time since the "Ados Line" was

created, the number of calls coming directly from young people in distress exceeded the number of calls from parents worried about their children.

The prevention team also answered **356 emails**, of which 253 were sent to the MALATAVIE prevention address and 103 to the Ciao.ch website.

**MALATAVIE Outpatient and Inpatient care** welcome adolescents aged 13 to 18 going through a suicidal crisis.

The facility allows for a pediatric psychiatric evaluation, individual and group crisis therapeutic care, work with the adolescent's family, and an assessment of socio-professional needs if necessary.

In 2022, the outpatient care team supported **341 adolescents through 2,512 interviews**. Hospital care welcomed **81 youths**. The average age of patients received was 15.8 years

## aiRe d'ados *Geneva*

The aiRe d'ados project, bringing together health and social professionals, was created in 2014 to strengthen the network of young people in distress and to build a safety net around them.

In 2022, aiRe d'ados comprised **39 members and 52 partner institutions**. After eight years of existence, the project has decided to clarify its mission, to define common values, to rethink the founding documents and to set up initiatives allowing a better knowledge of the social health network.

## Click4Help *Geneva*

In Geneva, many organisations offer a wide range of support and resources for young people aged 12 to 25, their families and the professionals who work with them. Children Action listed these resources on the click4help website where the desired information or help from these hundreds of organisations can be found with just a few clicks.

In 2022, **4,089 people** visited the click4help website with 5,038 connections.

Since its launch in 2017, **18,585 Internet users** have connected to the website to find an answer on topics such as suicide, behavioral problems, violence, sexuality, family, education or social and legal issues.

## House of the Child and the Adolescent - MEA *Geneva*

Focused on child and adolescent psychiatric care and medicine, the MEA represents a unique concept in Europe. It will position Geneva as a centre of excellence in Switzerland, offering a complete chain of care (outpatient consultations, day hospitals, inpatient beds) as well as cultural activities in a single location.

Started in January 2020, the MEA construction site entered its final stretch in 2022.

In July 2023, the first patients, aged 0 to 25, will be welcomed in this 12,600 m<sup>2</sup> space spread over seven levels.

Understanding the medical and societal stakes of the project, Children Action, a long-time partner of the HUG, has played a leading role in the vision and implementation of the MEA. Its commitment from the early stages, both financially and in terms of planning, enabled the MEA to become a reality and the HUG to mobilise for extending the public-private partnership with the substantial contribution of another local foundation.

*The measure of a society can be taken by the way it welcomes those who struggle to find their place within it. This issue becomes even more important when the suffering is a result of the discomfort that runs through a world in which some cannot fit in.*

*The House of the Child and the Adolescent - MEA aims to offer those who suffer a time and a place. A time and a place for new encounters. A time and a place for taking care of them. A time and a place for everything that weighs on them to be reconsidered differently. A time and a place for possible change. The MEA is a time and a place for a new becoming.*

*The future is at stake in the MEA. It is primarily the house of the future. Its bet is to play out a destiny that is all too determined in a different way. Like in the myth of the three Fates, the goddesses of destiny: there is Clotho, the fatal dispositions, there is Atropos, death, but there is also Lachesis, the one who suddenly gives the thread of destiny a different, unexpected and hoped-for direction. The MEA is the house of Lachesis. The MEA is the factory of the future. Between origin and becoming, it provides a time and a place for possible freedom, to reconsider what was, to do differently, every day more definitively.*

*You will have been that child: the future perfect tense is the time of becoming for both the child and the adolescent. There is the past but there is also the future. Between what was and what will be, there is the space for possible freedom. You will have been that child, and then you will become another child, another adolescent. It is this tension between the past and the future that the MEA will put into play, to allow everyone the choice, the freedom of a different becoming. The MEA is a time and a place for things to be played out differently. Between the past and the future, there is a gap, a “non-space-time” to use Hannah Arendt’s formulation, which gives everyone the opportunity to decide on a becoming that is not yet entirely determined.*

## LIFE *Zurich*

LIFE is a public-private partnership between the Psychiatric University Hospital in Zurich (PUK) and Children Action.

Opening its doors on October 3, 2022, this care and prevention centre for suicidal youth in the Canton of Zurich is designed after the model of MALATAVIE.

LIFE offers adolescents aged 13 to 18, in suicidal or depressive crisis or suffering:

- an inpatient crisis care unit
- a daycare unit
- an outpatient intensive care unit
- a prevention and early treatment unit

To break the deadlock, LIFE favours a resource-oriented approach that promotes the development of each patient's personal potential.

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# Access to care



Access to care and in particular to pediatric surgery is a fundamental right.

Unfortunately, *thousands of children with health issues* are unable to access adequate treatment due to a lack of financial resources, necessary skills, medication or appropriate facilities.

Since 1996, Children Action has set up surgical programs aimed at providing access to relevant and quality care for children aged 0 to 18.

Several missions are organised each year with the participation of the best European specialists in the medical field, allowing the treatment of children with complex pathologies as well as the training and sensitisation of local stakeholders.

This approach offers the opportunity for on-site caregivers to learn new techniques.

The goal is to ensure excellent care and follow-up of young patients.

After two years of suspension due to Covid-19, the missions were able to resume in 2022.

# Quality care and the transmission of know-how to act and perpetuate our action

## Orthopedic malformations *Vietnam*

Access to pediatric orthopedic surgery is a major challenge for child health in emerging countries. Children with deformities such as scoliosis, congenital hip dislocation and other problems often require surgery to treat these abnormalities and enable them to lead normal lives.

Since 1996, Children Action has organised several surgical missions to Vietnam each year.

These missions provide an opportunity to share experiences with local professionals.

In 2022, **50 children** with orthopedic malformations were operated.

## Burn injuries *Vietnam*

Children living in rural and poor areas are often at greater risk of burns. Poor living conditions, with frequent fires in the main room of the home, make domestic accidents more likely. Unfortunately, these burns can leave serious injuries that require specialised surgical care.

Since 1999, Children Action has been running a surgical programme to treat burn injuries in Vietnam.

The Foundation's medical teams travel to the field to work with their local counterparts, sharing their expertise and helping them to treat the most complex cases. They also bring medical

equipment and supplies to partner hospitals to improve care.

Thanks to this collaboration, Vietnamese children in need of specific procedures can receive appropriate treatment.

In 2022, **26 children** suffering from burn injuries were treated.

## Heart defects *Vietnam*

Pediatric heart defects in children, whether mild or severe, often require surgical intervention. Children with a heart defect have a reduced life expectancy and may suffer serious long-term complications.

The treatment of heart disease in emerging countries has improved considerably in recent years.

In Vietnam, Children Action works with local surgical teams at the Tamduc Clinic in Ho Chi Minh City and the VietDuc Hospital in Hanoi to organise operations for children who cannot access treatment due to a lack of financial resources

In 2022, **128 children with heart defects** benefited from a sometimes life-saving operation.



## Urological defects *Cameroon*

Urological defects are congenital anomalies that affect the functionality of the urinary system and kidneys. Surgery is often required to correct them.

Since 2009, Children Action has been collaborating with the medical teams of the Yaoundé Gynaecological Obstetrics and Paediatrics Hospital in Cameroon to treat children with urological problems.

in 2022, **16 patients** benefited from operations.

## "Humanitarian" surgeries *Switzerland*

In collaboration with the University Hospitals of Geneva, the Foundation provides surgery and medical treatment to children who are unable to receive appropriate care in their country of origin.

In 2022, **2 young Cameroonian patients** were operated on, one for a heart defect and the other for a urological defect.

## JAKAIRA *Argentina*

Since 2003, Children Action has been running the Jakaira project with the Kaleidos Foundation of Argentina, which accompanies teenage mothers, fathers and their babies. This project takes a comprehensive and interdisciplinary approach by considering two important developmental periods, namely early childhood and adolescence.

Jakaira has the following objectives:

- **Family cohabitation.** Promote the right to family cohabitation by offering support to adolescents in caring for their children.
- **Comprehensive child development.** Strengthen the safety net around infants in precarious situations in order to promote healthy development.
- **Early childhood bonds.** Care for the early bonds between babies and their mothers and fathers - if present - by working on the prevention of future psychopathological problems.

- **Family autonomy.** Support and promote family autonomy.

- **Family and social network.** Support adolescents within the family and social network.

- **Institutional network.** Improve links with the existing institutional network.

The team offers a personalised solution for each beneficiary. It also works with the social health network that surrounds young parents by setting up awareness-raising workshops in schools. Jakaira is present in Buenos Aires and Traslasierra.

In 2022, Jakaira supported **60 mothers, 10 fathers and 55 children**. The programme reached **2,673 pupils, teachers and students**.

## Red Mapa *Argentina*

After 18 years of experience in the field of teenage parenting and an established recognition at the national level, the Kaleidos Foundation, in collaboration with Children Action, decided to share this know-how by setting up the Red Mapa platform in 2022.

This platform allows access and the transfer of the methods and tools developed by Jakaira to the different structures dedicated to the support of teenage parents throughout Argentina.

In 2022, **6 organisations joined the platform. 17 of their employees took part in the intensive training**, enabling the emergence of 3 new programmes to support teenage parents in different parts of Argentina.

## Red Mami *Peru*

In Lima, since 2009, the Foundation has been collaborating with the Taller de Los Niños Association in the Red Mami project, which supports teenage mothers in the San Juan de Lurigancho favela.

The intervention includes twelve months of intensive support and twelve months of follow-up. It focuses on access to essential rights, protection from violence and strengthening resources and autonomy through the creation of a "support network" specific to each mother. Return to school and professional integration are also part of the programme.

In 2022, **344 new mothers aged 12 to 17 and 373 babies** joined the programme.

# Education & nutrition

In order to give the most disadvantaged children a chance to go to school, Children Action funds a number of *programmes that promote access to education.*

The Foundation is also involved in the occasional distribution of basic goods to families in need.

## School equipment

In many developing countries, the poorest families do not always have the means to buy their children basic school materials, such as notebooks, pencils and pens. In this context, the distribution of school kits enables access to school, which has an impact on the future of the poorest pupils.

### *Sri Lanka*

In Sri Lanka, since 2015, Children Action has been funding **500 school kits each year for the poorest pupils**. The distribution is carried out by our local partner, the Foundation of Goodness. These kits include the necessary equipment for one year of schooling: a bag, shoes, books, pencils and notebooks.

### *Vietnam*

In Vietnam, since 2007, the Foundation has been organising notebook distribution in nearly fifteen provinces.

In 2022, **130,000 notebooks** were distributed to **8,137 pupils**, covering their needs for the entire school year.

## School canteen meals

The distribution of school meals has a significant impact on the health, education and future of children living in emerging countries.

### *Vietnam*

Since 2007, Children Action has been providing school canteen meals for children from very disadvantaged families.

In 2022, **246,837 meals and snacks were served to 1,012 pupils**, providing them with a balanced diet.

### *Myanmar*

In Myanmar, since 2021, Children Action has been running a school feeding programme in a monastery located 30 kilometres from Rangoon.

In 2022, **88,600 meals were served to the 98 young residents and 322 students** from the poorest families living in the vicinity of the school, thus ensuring their growth and well-being.

## Center for blind and visually impaired children

### *Vietnam*

Since 1994, Children Action has been supporting a centre specialising in the care of blind and visually impaired children from rural and remote areas of Vietnam, where there are no facilities. The children are sent there by their parents to live and study until they finish school.

The children attend school, learn the braille alphabet, play various musical instruments, do sports and learn basic massage techniques.

They participate in national and international chess and handisport competitions.

When they leave the centre, they have a foundation of basic knowledge and skills that help them to become independent and confident in life

In 2022, the centre welcomed **35 blind children**.

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## Emergency help – distribution of basic goods and medical equipment

### *Ukraine*

The conflict in Ukraine, which began in February 2022, has affected thousands of families, including children, who have been denied access to basic needs.

Children Action worked with a trusted partner based in Poland to organise deliveries of food and hygiene products to children and families

living in war-affected areas. The Foundation also delivered an incubator and medical equipment for the maternity unit in Ivano Frankivsk.

**Over 36 tons of goods were distributed in 13 trips.**

### *Sri Lanka*

Sri Lanka is facing its worst economic crisis since independence in 1948. A severe shortage of foreign currency means that the country can no longer afford the medicines and equipment that are essential to maintain health care services.

In response, Children Action has delivered medical equipment and diagnostic tools to Sri Lanka's largest free pediatric hospital, Lady Ridgeway, and to the Apeksha Hospital, which treats children with cancer.

**200 young patients a week** benefit from this contribution, which enables the diagnosis and management of hematological malignancies such as leukemia and lymphoma.

### *Myanmar*

As a result of the political unrest caused by the military coup, more than 250,000 children have been displaced to camps in the border area of Karen State. They live there with their families in precarious conditions.

In 2022, Children Action worked with its local partner to fund the production of nutritional energy bars for children under 10 and food aid for families.

In total, 46,080 energy bars, 6,912 bottles of milk, 768 packs of dried meat, and 768 bottles of cooking oil were distributed to **192 children and their families** between October 2022 and January 2023.

## Distribution of basic necessities

### *Switzerland*

In 2022, Children Action continued its collaboration with Cartons du Coeur, which began during the Covid-19 pandemic, to support families in difficulty.

The Foundation financed the purchase and distribution of hygiene products for children whose parents are weakened by the health and economic crisis:

- 64,800 nappies
- 3,072 feeding bottles
- 2,100 packs of wet wipes
- 1,080 bodies
- 3,456 baby shower/bath gels
- 10,368 children's toothbrushes

# Wellbeing in hospital



The Foundation sets up programs within the pediatric services of the Geneva University Hospitals to *improve the quality of life of sick children* and their relatives during the often difficult period of hospitalisation and to *provide support to the care teams*.

## Sabrina Project *Switzerland*

Within the pediatric onco-hematology Unit of the Geneva University Hospitals, the Sabrina Project provides professional services to accompany sick children, to relieve their parents and to meet the needs of the care teams. Hospitalised children benefit from art therapy sessions, recreational, artistic and educational activities.

As part of the Sabrina Project, Children Action offers:

- visits from medical students who come two hours a day, five days a week, to play, entertain and talk with the children;
- an art therapist four hours a week;
- a storyteller four hours a month;
- a home-based repeater service to facilitate the resumption of the school year after sometimes long and repeated hospital stays;
- A programme of family therapy and inter-generational counselling, delivered by two medical therapists, to help families cope with their child's illness;
- a contribution to the Ronald McDonald House for each night spent by the families of a child affected by cancer.

These actions provide:

- an approach that allows children to express themselves on the disease in a different way;
- an entertaining moment that can help them forget about their suffering for a while;
- time off for parents.

## Training in clinical hypnosis and therapeutic communication *Switzerland*

Therapeutic communication and clinical hypnosis are two valuable tools in the treatment of sick children. These approaches help little patients to cope better with medical treatments, procedures and hospital stays.

hypnosis and 448 carers in pediatric therapeutic communication, enabling approximately **500 children per year** to benefit from these methods improving their hospital journey.

Since 2018, Children Action has been collaborating in the implementation of training programs in therapeutic communication and clinical hypnosis for the caregivers of the Child and Adolescent Department of the Geneva University Hospitals. These courses allow the care teams to acquire specific knowledge in the management of pain, stress and anxiety induced by disease or care with a real benefit for the young patients.

Transforming a blood test into a snowball fight, the insertion of a gastric tube into a toboggan ride or intense pain into a trip to the end of the world... the challenge is ambitious, but brilliantly met by the children and the professionals trained.

In 2022, **two training courses in pediatric therapeutic communication** were delivered.

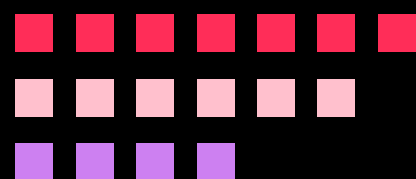
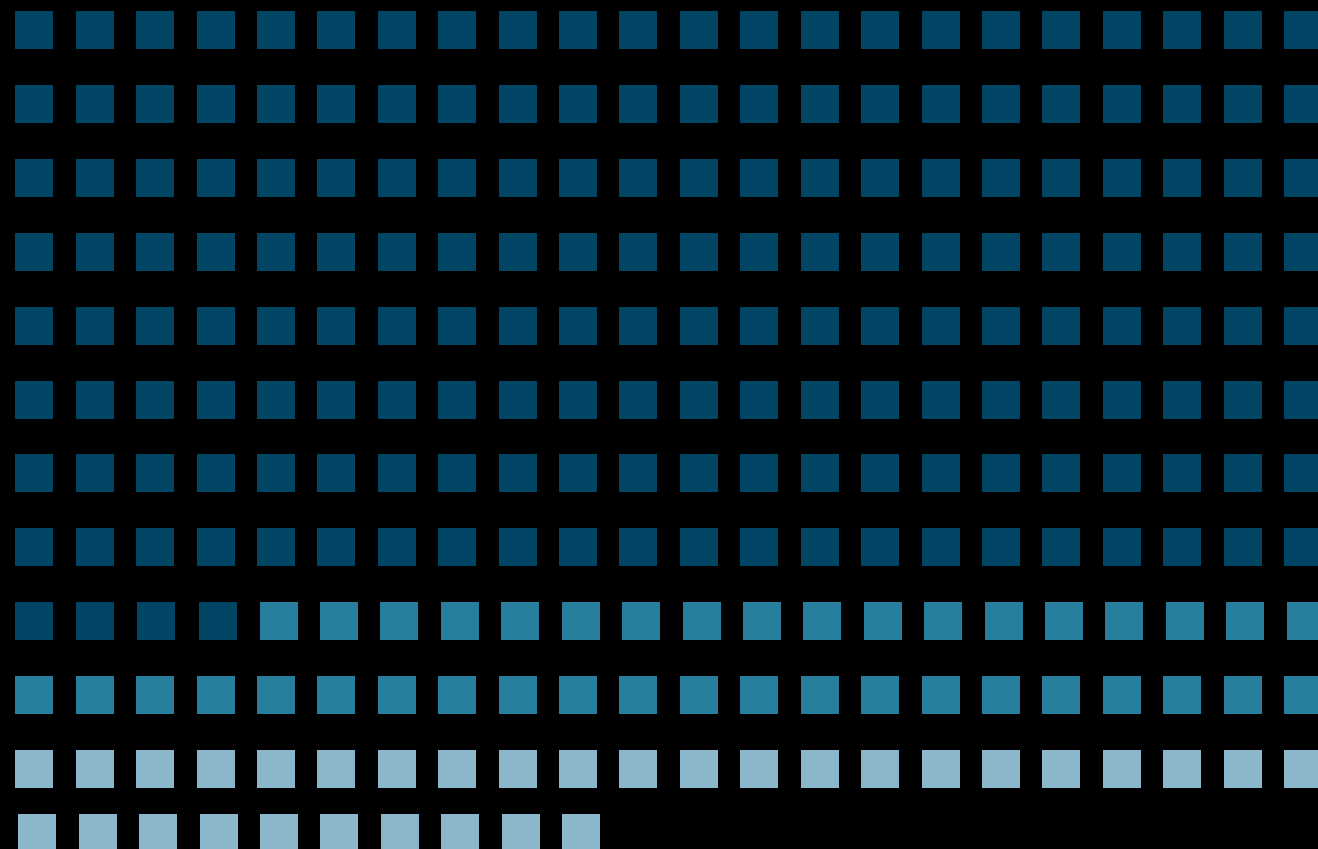

## Relying on the expertise of professionals

Each project is managed by professionals who are recognised in their field, working closely with field teams and local communities to identify and respond to needs effectively.

In 2022, more than 266 people contributed to the Foundation's projects, including paid professionals and volunteers.

Administrative, logistical and technical staff, surgeons, psychiatrists, doctors and other specialists provide their skills and expertise to ensure the quality of the Foundation's programmes.

## A participatory environment

A participatory environment is developed for each project to increase the resources needed to implement the programmes. Thanks to this system, through local partnerships, the involvement of volunteer teams, material donations, pro bono services from benefactors and cost optimisation, the value of the projects funded by the Foundation is multiplied by three on average.

In 2022, partnerships with the University Hospitals of Geneva, the University Psychiatric Hospital of Zurich, the Kaleidos Foundation in Argentina, the Taller de los Niños Association in Peru, the Health Committees of the Vietnamese provinces, our partners in Poland, the participation of families, collaborations with the various structures and volunteers have contributed to multiplying the funds allocated by our donors.

As in previous years, all salaries at Children Action's headquarters and all administrative costs were covered by the Founder and his Family Foundation, allowing 100% of the funds raised to be allocated to actions in the field.

## Fundraising evening *Dolce Serata - Geneva*

Children Action organised its eleventh gala evening on 7 November 2022. This event brought together Michel Boujenah, Elie Semoun, Dany Boon, Arthur and Catherine Deneuve, who have always supported the Foundation. They were joined by Louis Bertignac, Imany, Paul Mirabel, Emma Peters, Yael Naim and Umberto Tozzi.

The show was followed by a dinner concocted by Chef Simone Zanoni - Le George in Paris, and by Chef Michel Roth - Hotel Président in Geneva.

The evening ended with an auction of unique lots donated by personalities and prestigious brands.

It was conducted jointly, in an exceptional manner, by Christie's, Phillips in association with Bacs & Russo and Sotheby's.

Thanks to the solidarity and generosity of all, **a net profit of more than 14 million Swiss francs** was achieved, every franc of which was allocated to the Foundation's projects.

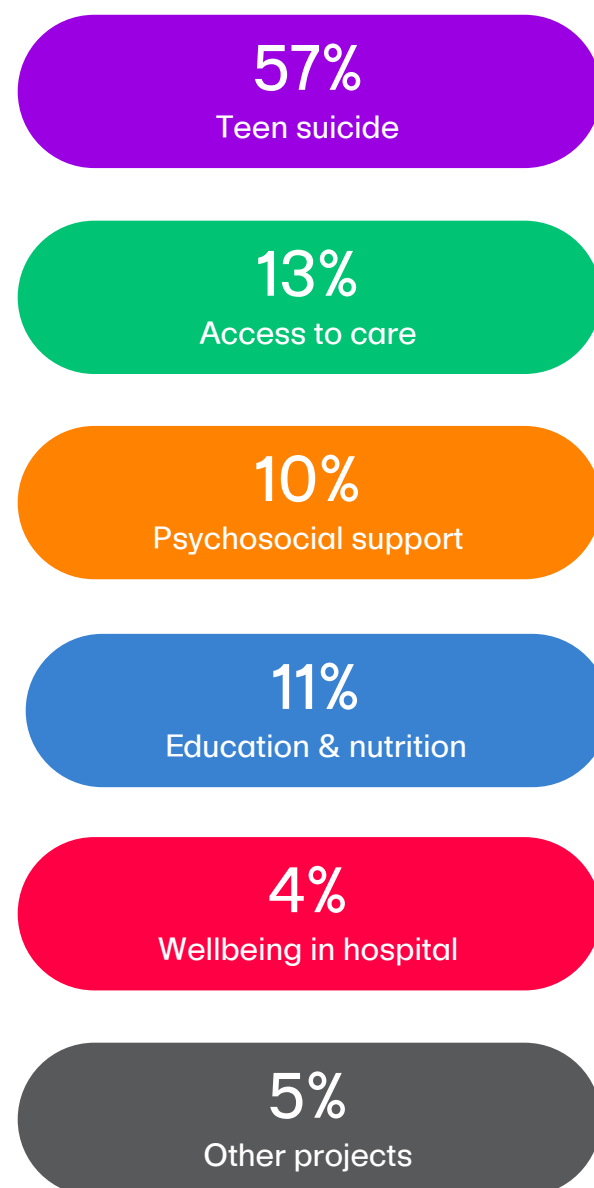

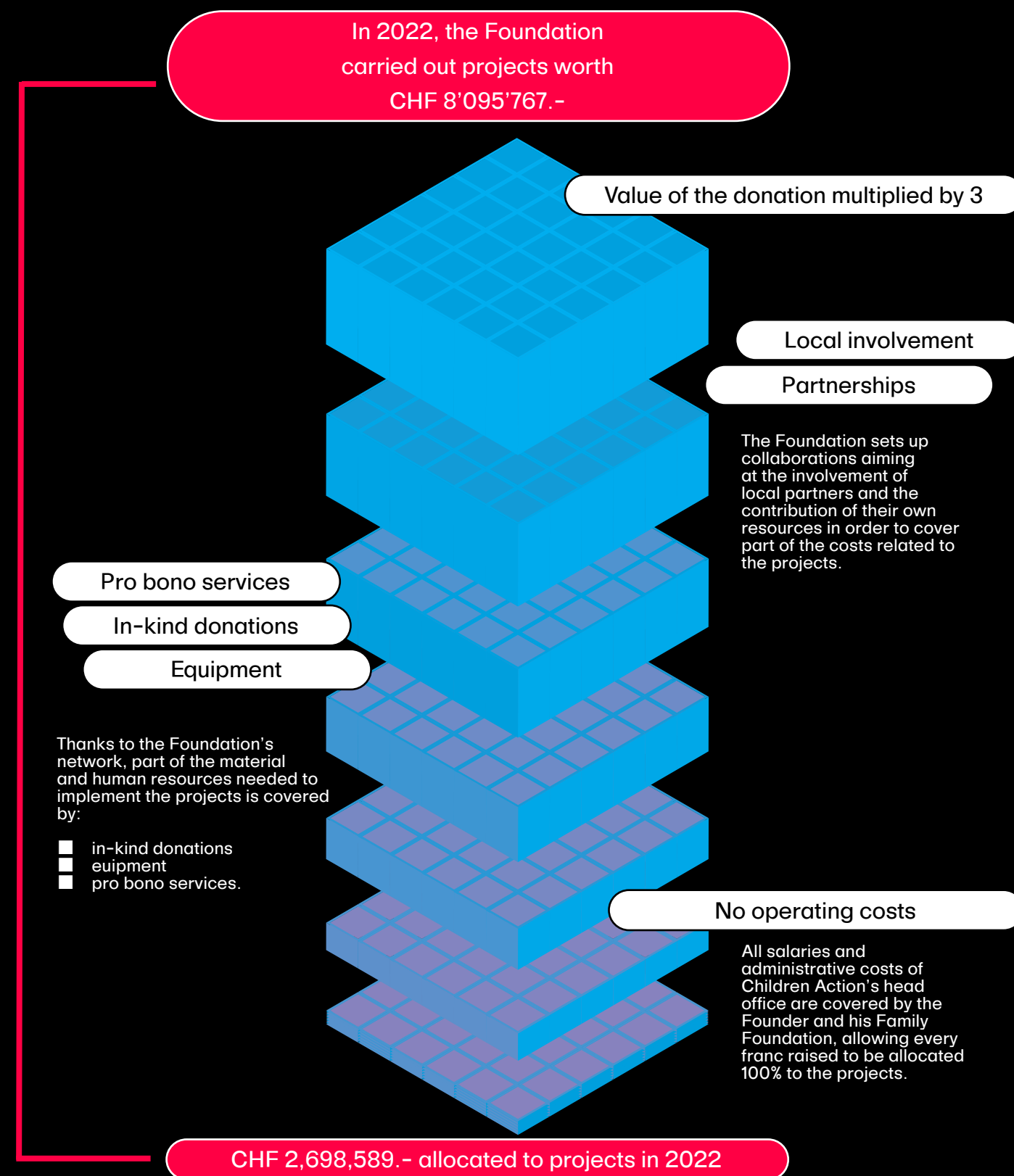


## Allocation of funds in 2022
